



TIP *Defining* a word and checking the *Grammar* gives you fuller understanding in its context.

How to Use the Dictionary



To Understand God,

You Must Understand the **WORDS** He Uses!

Did you know the Old Testament was written mostly in Hebrew and the New Testament was written in the Greek?


Because the English language is somewhat limited, we will be checking out several words in the *Hebrew/Greek Dictionaries*, designated by , to uncover the definitions, to help us in our understanding.

These words we refer to as *Key Words*, designated by , because they are *key* to the text, often repeated, helping us see what is talked about the most. And like a *key* they unlock the meaning to what God is *saying*. Remember God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit are always *key*.

TIP Open the **LOOK** Section - tap on 

- Different Road Signs appear to help you **LOOK**.
- Do you see the  **Key Words** and  **Words to Define?**
- Scroll over any sign for a quick signal, or tap on the sign for clear directions.
- Just remember: Touch anything in **COLOR** for information and guidance.
- To Open any of these sites: tap on 
- To Close: tap the 

When scanning the **LOOK** Section, if we open the  for James **Ch 1**, we see '**consider**' is **key**, and should be defined.



Let's do it. Go to James Chapter 1:2.

Check out '**consider**' in the **Dictionary**.

- Tap on the word '**consider**' in the Bible *text*, in the screen on the **left**.
- '**Consider**' will pop up in the **Dictionary** screen in lower **right** hand corner.
- Read through the quick definition and see what you discover.
- At the end of the quick definition you will see '**more**'
- Tap on '**more**' for more detailed information.
- Once you have a clear definition, reinsert the definition into the text, as this will give better comprehension and help you remember the **meaning**.

- To Close the **Dictionary**: tap on the  the upper tool bar.

What does '**consider**' mean in the Greek?

Consider, *hēgéomai*; to lead, have the rule over, suppose, think.

Do you see the reference for **Jam 1:2**?

“Figuratively, to lead out before the mind, i.e. to view, regard, esteem, consider (2Co 9:5; Php 2:3, 6; 3:7, 8; 1Th 5:13; 2Th 3:15; 1Ti 1:12; 6:1; Heb 10:29; 11:11, 26; **Jas 1:2**; 2Pe 1:13; 2:13; 3:9, 15).”

In James then we see '**consider**' **means**:

- To lead out before the mind.
- To look ahead.
- To view, regard, esteem.

Don't stop there.

Take what you have **LEARNED** back to the text to see what it means in its context.

“Consider [view - really think, think about what is happening, it's result, and where it is leading; look ahead to the good that will come] it all joy...”

Doesn't this help you grasp what God **means** when He says in Jam 1:2,

“Consider it all joy when you encounter various trials...”?

When we understand the **Words God uses,
then we clearly understand what He **means!****

NOW, Understanding the **Grammar**

Now, let's learn how to check out the **Grammar**.

Go to James Chapter 1:2.

Check out '*consider*' in the [Dictionary](#).

'Consider' is a verb.


Verbs express action and often are very significant to what the author is saying. Understanding the Greek verb is critical to correct interpretation and application.

The Greek language wonderfully constructs verbs to clearly show:

- who does the action;
- whether the statement is a command or suggestion; and
- whether the statement is a reality or possibility.


STICK with us, your going to see why the *Grammar* is so critical!

In the YDT APP, you must be in the **KJ** version.




- Go to the upper tool bar to the far left.
- Tap the **Bible Version** tab (that is probably in the **NAS** version.)
- Your selection will open up.
- To Open to **KJ**: tap on **KJ**

Find the Word you want to investigate e.g. '*consider/count*'.




- Tap ‘*count*’ (*consider* in the NAS) in the text of your Bible.
- The Dictionary will open in the bottom **right** hand corner.

Find the Grammar Code



- In the Dictionary: scroll past ‘*more*’ to the very bottom.
- Tap on ‘Grammar codes’ to open.
- See the ‘Grammar code’ for *consider*: aipm Greek

To understand the code given:



- Scroll back up to the Dictionary Tool Bar
- Tap on the question mark in the blue circle
- The ‘Help’ Section will open

Giving an Explanation of the Grammar Codes.

NOTE:at the beginning of the Grammar Code information (for verbs) you will see, in order, the specifics of the tense, then mood and finally voice. Combining the below definitions of the specific words given will help you understand the meaning of the verb.

Tense expresses time and/or duration of action.

- *Present*: the idea I am going instead of I go, the action being the process
- *Aorist*: just reference to the action as happening, action without regard to duration
- *Perfect*: past completed action with presently continuing results
- *Imperfect*: continuous action in past time
- *Future*: portraying action yet future

Mood represents either that which is actual or that which is possible


- *Actual*: Indicative: Declaration of fact/reality - indicates what is true about the subject
- *Possible*
 - *Imperative*: Command - potential reality; imposes a demand upon the will to do what is commanded and is contingent upon the response
 - *Subjunctive*: Contingency - expresses uncertainty, objectively possible depending upon certain conditions and/or response
 - *Optative*: possible - expresses a wish/desire

Voice indicates the subject is related to the action

- *Active*: subject produces the action (example: "but God shows His love for us" Rom 5:8)
- *Passive*: subject receives the action (example: "...but you were sanctified, you were justified... 1 Cor 6:11)

- To Close the ‘Help’ Section: just tap anywhere on the *text* box.
- To Close the Dictionary: tap on the  in the upper tool bar.

To get back to the NAS Version



- Tap on the Bible version tab in the upper tool bar to the left;
- When it opens, tap on **NAS**.

What did you discover?

The verb '**consider**' is an **Aorist Imperative Middle**.

- Aorist tense – is like a snapshot, showing an action occurs.
- Imperative mood – usually is a command.
- Middle voice – the subject initiates the actions and participates in the

Wow! When James says, '**consider**' *it all joy*, it is a **command**. This is not an option.

Do you see why checking out the **Grammar** is so vital to our understanding?

**When we understand the Words God uses,
then we clearly understand what He *means and expects!***
